Working with volunteers: – what worked for Dukesfield

- 1. There's a variety of types of volunteers
- 2. They have different motivations
- 3. Move them from Passive to Passionate
- 4. They want to be valued:
 - Showcase their voices
 - ii. Celebrate their successes
 - iii. Help their learning
 - iv. Share their enjoyment





1 - Varieties of volunteers

Cabinet Office - Community Life Survey (2014-15)

- 1. Formal volunteering help given through a group, club or organisation
- 2. Employer volunteering help given that was encouraged by employer
- 3. Informal volunteering unpaid help given to other people who aren't relatives

69% of people had volunteered at least once in the last 12 months, 42% formally volunteering. The proportion of people formally volunteering has remained similar compared to 2013-14.

Levels of participation in informal (34%), formal (27%) and overall volunteering (47%) at least once a month have remained similar compared to 2013-14 and 2012-13

In 2014-15, 8% of people participated in employer volunteering, no change from 2013-14 but a significant increase compared to 2012-13 (6%)





1 - Varieties of volunteers

Heritage Lottery Fund:

HLF values volunteers – the time they give to your project can be counted as an in-kind contribution to offset against the cash grant you are requesting. HLF have grouped volunteer work into three bands and have published the following value for a day's labour:


1. Professional labour £350 a day E.g. accountancy or legal advice

2. Skilled labour £150 a day E.g. administrative work

3. Unskilled labour £50 a day E.g. working as a steward at an event

A volunteer may do several jobs at different rates

– it depends on the work, not the person
